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Dr. Chris Hillis – Dr. Hillis MD MSc FRCPC is an Associate Professor and the Director of Post-Graduate Quality Improvement and Patient Safety (QIPS) Education at McMaster University. He is the Chief of Oncology for the Juravinski Cancer Program (Hamilton Health Sciences) and President of the Canadian Hematology Society. Previously, he served as Course Director for the ASPIRE Program with the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada. He completed an MSc in QIPS at the University of Toronto and was a Quality Scholar at the US Department of Veterans Affairs. His clinical practice focuses on the care of patients with CLL and MPNs.
